### QUESTION NO. 1 NO



Shall the City of Kansas City, Missouri issue its general obligation bonds in an amount not to exceed \$600,000,000.00 for the purpose of paying for the construction and reconstruction of streets, bridges, and sidewalks? The authorization of the bonds will authorize the City to maintain tangible property tax rates sufficient to pay the interest and principal on the bonds until fully paid.

#### QUESTION NO. 2 NO



Shall the City of Kansas City, Missouri issue its general obligation bonds in an amount not to exceed \$150,000,000.00 for the purpose of paying for the acquisition, construction, equipping and reconstruction of flood control projects including, but not limited to, projects partially funded with Federal grants? The authorization of the bonds will authorize the City to maintain tangible property tax rates sufficient to pay the interest and principal on the bonds until fully paid.

#### QUESTION NO. 3 NO



Shall the City of Kansas City, Missouri issue its general obligation bonds in an amount not to exceed \$50,000,000.00 for the purpose of paying for the acquisition, construction, equipping and improving of public buildings, facilities, and structures including, but not limited to, the Animal Shelter and for Americans with Disabilities Act improvements to public buildings and structures? The authorization of the bonds will authorize the City to maintain tangible property tax rates sufficient to pay the interest and principal on the bonds until fully paid.

# **QUESTION NO. 4 YES CENTRAL CITY ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT SALES TAX – ONE CITY**

Shall the City of Kansas City impose a sales tax authorized by Section 67.1305 of the Revised Statutes of Missouri for a period of 10 years at a rate of 1/8% to be used for funding economic development projects within the area bounded by 9th Street on the north; Gregory Boulevard on the south; The Paseo on the west; and Indiana Avenue on the east, which may include the retirement of debt under previously authorized bonded indebtedness or to repay bonds not yet issued?

## QUESTION NO. 5 YES **REDUCTION OF PENALTIES FOR POSSESSION OR CONTROL OF MARIJUANA AND PARAPHERNALIA**

Shall the City of Kansas City limit the authorized punishment that can be imposed in the Municipal Court for the possession or control of 35 grams or less of marijuana to a maximum \$25 fine, eliminate jail as a potential punishment for the possession or control of marijuana, and remove marijuana from the prohibition against drug paraphernalia?
