Welcome back to my Capitol update and legislative column. What an electric time this is to be in Missouri, and an even better time to be in Kansas City! The Plaza is lit red, Chiefs flags adorn porches and vehicles, storefronts are decorated with regalia and every media outlet is focused on the big game. If the Super Bowl could be decided by fans' intensity and stadium decibel levels, the Chiefs would bring home the Lombardi Trophy every year! Even non-Chiefs fans can attest this is an amazing team, time and opportunity for our beloved city. I join the cheers from the metro area and state's sea of red and send my loudest, most heartfelt GO CHIEFS to the entire kingdom and organization.

This has also been an eventful week in Jefferson City. On Feb. 8, we gathered in the House Chamber to listen to the chief justice's State of the Judiciary address. During the delivery, he simply stated the function of the judiciary, "We resolve disputes." In fact, Missouri courts settle an average of 750,000 cases per year, most of which occur in local circuit courts. The chief justice also boasted about a successful collaboration between the Department of Corrections and the Department of Mental Health, the

Missouri Justice Reinvestment Initiative. This is a tailored approach to give those entangled in our criminal justice system the tools they need to stay out of prison, address underlying mental and behavioral health issues and reduce parole and probation violations, and in turn, recidivism. He closed his address with blessing our state and "Patrick Mahomes' right ankle!"

In addition to attending this annual address to a joint session, members of the Senate have been busy with committee hearings. One of the committees I proudly serve is on is Appropriations. Tasked with drafting our state's operating budget for the next fiscal year, members of this committee primarily listen to funding requests from all of the state departments while the House Budget Committee conducts hearings and advances proposals based on the governor's recommendations. I'll close with a small tribute to Black History Month and a quote from my favorite poet and activist, Maya Angelou. "Do the best you can until you know better. Then, when you know better, do better." I try to heed this advice at our State Capitol and in my personal life every day. educating my colleagues about systemic racism and the issues impacting communities of color. I believe Missouri can be better and do better with a little more knowledge and understanding, and less discord.
