Already there have been 640 bills pre-filed in the Missouri House to repeal or make changes in existing Missouri laws or enact new laws and 362 bills pre-filed in the Senate.

There have been 39 proposed amendments to the Missouri constitution prefiled in the House and 17 pre-filed in the Senate.

Legislation is still being pre-filed every day during the work week, and many more proposals will be introduced once the session starts. While many proposals are similar to others, few are short in length, so carefully reading legislation before discussing and voting on it is very important.

The difference of one word, such as between shall and may, can make a world of difference!

# WEEKLY CAPITOL UPDATE

Thursday, December 23rd, 2021

## **JUDGE REJECTS COUNTIES' MOTIONS**

Cole County Circuit Judge Dan Green on Dec. 22 denied motions to intervene from five counties seeking to appeal his recent decision striking down several state health department regulations.

The counties are expected to appeal Green's denial of their intervention, thus still getting the issue before a higher court.

Although significant, Green's Nov. 22 decision was limited to declaring unconstitutional four state regulations authorizing the Missouri Department of Health and Senior Services to delegate responses to public health emergencies to local officials.

However, Attorney General Eric Schmitt has used Green's ruling as the basis for demanding that all local governments immediately cease all coronavirus mitigation efforts.

The targets of Schmitt's legal threats have included school districts and other agencies that derive their authority to act against the spread of contagious disease, not from the disputed regulations, but from state laws that weren't challenged in the case and are still in full effect.

While some local officials have given in to Schmitt's threats, others have been defiant, saying the attorney general has no legal authority to unilaterally override the relevant state laws.

Although the state health department wanted Schmitt to appeal Green's ruling on its behalf, Schmitt refused, and the department opted not to hire outside legal counsel to continue the case. That left it to local governments impacted by the decision to take up the cause.

Jackson and St. Louis counties filed the original motion to intervene on Dec. 13, and later were joined by the health departments in Cooper, Livingston and Jefferson counties. In their motion, the counties said Green's ruling created "chaos" throughout the state by throwing the validity of coronavirus mitigation efforts into question at a time when the new and highly contagious omicron variant is causing case numbers

## to skyrocket across the country.

Even though Schmitt has been attempting to enforce Green's ruling for the last month, it didn't actually take effect until Dec. 22. If the counties do appeal, a higher court could block enforcement while the case is pending.

### MoDOT SUES TO ENFORCE SPENDING POWER

The Missouri State Highways and Transportation Commission is suing the state in an effort to enforce its constitutional authority to spend State Road Fund revenue without a legislative appropriation.

The commission wants to provide raises for Department of Transportation employees to combat high turnover rates, but the legislature hasn't approved an appropriations increase for that purpose.

The Missouri Constitution generally prohibits state agencies from spending money without a legislative appropriation specifying the amount and purpose of the spending. However, MoDOT is unique since it has a constitutionally dedicated funding source in the State Road Fund, the revenues of which the constitution says "shall stand appropriated without legislative action."

Despite this language, the General Assembly traditionally appropriates money from the Road Fund each year, just as it does from other revenue sources under its direct control.

The commission, which is the independent governing authority for MoDOT, sued the Missouri Office of Administration on Dec. 3 after that agency ignored the commission's requests to approve monetary transfers from the Road Fund pursuant to the "stands appropriated" provision for the purpose of increasing worker pay.

A similar case – though one with an important distinction – already is pending before the Missouri Supreme Court. In that case, the Missouri Conservation Commission claims it has the constitutional authority to spend revenue from a dedicated state conservation sales tax without a legislative appropriation. Unlike with the Road Fund, however, there is no constitutional language that says the conservation sales tax revenue "shall

stand appropriated without legislative action."

No hearing date has yet been set in the Road Fund case, *Missouri Highways* and *Transportation Commission v. Kenneth Zellers*.

## **MINIMUM WAGE INCREASING TO \$11.15**

The standard statewide minimum wage for most Missouri workers will increase to \$11.15 an hour on Jan. 1, a jump of 85 cents from the current rate of \$10.30 an hour. The bump will be the fourth of five phased-in increases approved by voters in 2018, with the final one taking Missouri's minimum wage to \$12 in 2023.

Missouri's standard minimum wage had been \$7.85 an hour until Missouri voters enacted Proposition B in November 2018 with 62.3 percent support. The initial increase of 75 cents an hour called for by Proposition B took effect in 2019. It has been followed by 85-cent-anhour bumps each year since. For the past year, the standard minimum wage has been set at \$10.30 an hour.

State agencies and local governments – counties, municipalities, school districts and other political subdivisions of the state – are exempt from paying the wage increases Proposition B mandates for private sector employers. Government employers are still required to pay workers the old state minimum wage of \$7.85 an hour, which is higher than the current federal minimum wage of \$7.25 an hour.

Because of high vacancy rates in state jobs caused in part by low pay, Gov. Mike Parson on Dec. 6 proposed establishing a \$15 minimum wage for state employees. Lawmakers would have to approve the spending for Parson's pay proposal during the upcoming legislative session, which begins Jan. 5.

# Department of Natural Resources offers home weatherization assistance

JEFFERSON CITY, MO, DEC. 21, 2021 - The Missouri Department of Natural Resources has weatherization assistance available to increase energy efficiency and improve the health of your home. As families spend more time at home during winter, they tend to use more energy, which means energy efficiency benefits become even more critical.

The department's Weatherization Assistance Program (WAP) is critical to meeting heating and cooling needs of Missourians with low-incomes, especially as many seniors and other vulnerable households shelter at home due to COVID-19. WAP makes homes more energy efficient, safer and healthier.

To apply for assistance, clients should contact their local weatherization agency. The agency will ask applicants to complete the appropriate forms, including income documentation, to verify eligibility. Once the client is verified as eligible, an auditor from the agency will conduct an energy audit of the home to determine what measures will produce the greatest energy savings. The next step is for the agency crew or contractor to install the energy-efficient measures on the home. After the weatherization is complete, a quality control inspector will examine the home to check quality and completeness of the work.

Eligibility is based on the family unit's size and total income. A single person with a maximum income of \$25,760 is eligible and a home with two residents must have a maximum income of \$34,840 to qualify. Local weatherization agencies can provide further information about maximum family income and other details regarding program eligibility.

Properly insulating and sealing air leaks can help many homes save as much as 30% in winter heating costs. Home weatherization not only saves homeowners money and leaves them with a more comfortable living space, it also reduces the pollution associated with generating energy used for heating.

Weatherization leads to significant health benefits. Read the @ENERGY "Home Rx" report available at <a href="bit.ly/2iUEQ59">bit.ly/2iUEQ59</a>. Residents with asthma reported fewer hospitalizations and emergency room visits after weatherization and families' out-of-pocket medical expenses decreased by an average of \$514, according to @ORNL. Children missed fewer school days after their homes received energy efficiency services from WAP. Weatherization returns \$2.78 in health-and-safety related benefits for every \$1 invested.

# **South KC Mobile Food Pantries**

Many families in south Kansas City are being forced to rely on community food pantries such as Community Assistance Council's to have enough to eat.

Fortunately, Harvesters (the community food network) brings the semi-truck that serves as its mobile food pantry to seven sites in south Kansas City monthly to distribute fresh produce and other healthy food to families in need. The sites are:

**Center School District,** 8701 Holmes Rd., from 9 a.m. to 10:30 a.m. as long as food is left on the first Saturday of the month. Persons should drive through the bus parking lot to the district warehouse. The event is sponsored by Three

Trails Community church in partnership with the Center School District. (There will be no pantry in January.)

**Center District Warehouse,** 8701 Holmes Rd., from 11:30 a.m. to 1:30 p.m. the second Friday of each month. Persons should go to the entrance to the Center Administrative Office and drive through the bus parking lot to the warehouse where volunteers will load the food. Persons should take the Troost Ave exit. The event is sponsored by the Center Education Foundation in partnership with the Center School District.

**Evangel Church,** 1414 E. 103<sup>rd</sup> St., from 7 to 8:30 a.m. the second Saturday of the month. Persons may remain in their vehicles, and food will be brought to them.

United Believers Community Church, 5600 E. 112th Terr., with vehicles lining up at 8:30 a.m. and contactless food distribution running from 9 to 11 a.m. the third Wednesday of the month.

**Ruskin High School,** 7000 E. 111<sup>th</sup> St., from 4 to 5:30 p.m. the third Thursday of the month. Vehicles should line up on Ruskin Way on the east side of the school, and staff and students will load the food when vehicles reach the school.

**Colonial Presbyterian Church,** 9500 Wornall Rd., with registration beginning at 8 a.m. and food distribution running from about 8:30 to 10 a.m. on the third Saturday of the month. Families are asked to bring two cardboard boxes for volunteers to put the food in.

**Red Bridge United Methodist Church**, 636 E. 117<sup>th</sup> St., the new date during December was Monday December 20th from 2:30 to 3:30 p.m. In the new year food distribution will continue on the fourth Friday of the month in the church parking lot.
