

In May, Missouri Governor, Mike Parson was joined by State Senator, Barbara Washington, State Representative, Mark Sharp and NLBM President, Bob Kendrick, at Kauffman Stadium to sign SB 189, which creates a special Missouri license plate commemorating the NLBM.

WEEKLY CAPITOL UPDATE

Friday, September 17, 2021

VETO OVERRIDE SPARKS SENATE INFIGHTING

An attempt to override one of Gov. Mike Parson's line-item budget vetoes sparked fierce infighting among Senate Republicans on Sept. 15, with members of the majority party spending several hours angrily arguing over whether the chamber's unwritten traditions should trump its formal procedural rules.

The annual veto session ultimately ended with no overrides.

Parson vetoed four bills lawmakers passed during the 2021 regular legislative session. He also issued 51 line-item budget vetoes that struck about \$115 million in spending authority from the \$35 billion state operating budget for the 2022 fiscal year which began July 1.

Lawmakers are constitutionally required to convene each September to consider whether to pursue any override attempts.

The House of Representatives voted to override four of Parson's line-item vetoes. Those involved \$150,000 for refunds to taxpayers affected by a changed interpretation in state sales tax laws, \$2.1 million for a pay increase for state Children's Division workers, \$300,000 for a Lincoln County program focusing on crimes against children and \$700,000 for a community

improvement district in Boone County. All but the last passed nearly unanimously with only 2 or 3 dissenting votes. I voted for all four overrides.

The override efforts then shifted to the Senate, where it is tradition – but not an actual rule – that only a bill's handler can make an override motion. Nonetheless, state Sen. Mike Moon, R-Ash Grove, attempted to make an override motion on the tax refund veto even though he wasn't the bill's handler.

However, Lt. Gov. Mike Kehoe refused to recognize Moon's motion. Although the lieutenant governor is the formal presiding officer of the Senate, the role is mostly ceremonial and carries little authority over chamber procedures.

After Senate President Pro Tem Dave Schatz, R-Sullivan, upheld Kehoe's decision, the chamber's conservative faction brought proceedings to a standstill arguing over the propriety of Kehoe's action and interpretations of Senate rules.

The impasse was broken when state Sen. Dan Hegeman, R-Cosby and handler of the appropriations bills, agreed to make the override motion. However, Hegeman angrily complained of being "disrespected" by those senators who wouldn't defer to his traditional prerogatives as the bill's handler. The override effort ultimately failed on a vote of 13-15, falling 10 votes short of the 23 needed to approve it by the required two-thirds margin.

Hegeman later made a motion to override the veto of funding for the Lincoln County program focusing on crimes against children at the request of another senator, although he again made it clear he supported the governor's veto. That override failed on a 16-13 vote.

Prior to the Senate meltdown, House Democrats pursued overrides which I voted for on three other budget vetoes – two involving a total of \$26.4 million in federal funds for rate increases for in-home care providers under the Medicaid program and one involving \$1 million to expand the Missouri Rx prescription drug program. However, none of those three efforts were successful.

REVENUE DOWN 22.5% SO FAR IN FY 2022

Net state general revenue collections for the first two months of the 2022 fiscal year were down 22.5 percent compared to the same period last year, going from \$2.15 billion to \$1.66 billion this year.

However, because the income tax deadline was pushed from April to July last year due to the COVID-19 pandemic, state revenue collections during the early months of FY 2021 were drastically inflated, thus skewing comparisons with this year's collections.

Net general revenue collections for August 2021 only decreased 3 percent compared to those for August 2020, going from \$991.6 million last year to \$962.2 billion this year.

The task force is also seeking comments and suggestions from the public on how to strengthen protections and services for Missouri sexual assault victims. Comments and suggestions are being gathered through an online survey

at https://www.surveymonkey.com/r/MORightsTaskForce. The survey closes Sept. 30, 2021.

The Missouri Rights of Victims of Sexual Assault Task Force was created through Senate Bill 569, which was signed into law by Governor Mike Parson in July 2020. In addition to including the "Justice for Survivors Act" and the "Sexual Assault Survivors' Bill of Rights," it mandated establishment of the task force, which must "collect feedback from stakeholders, practitioners, and leadership throughout the state and local law enforcement, victim services, forensic science practitioners, and health care communities to inform development of future best practices or clinical guidelines regarding the care and treatment of survivors."

SB 569 also requires the task force to study nationally recognized best

practices and make recommendations regarding the development and implementation of a method for tracking and investigating complaints about the handling of sexual assault investigations and reporting, and the development of documentation to be provided to sexual assault survivors informing them of their rights. It also directs the task force to determine when there is a need for additional employees or volunteers at rape crisis centers, determine the costs of meeting the potential need and methods for meeting the need.

The task force is required to submit a report on its findings, including any majority and dissenting opinions to the Governor and General Assembly by Dec. 31, 2021. The Department of Public Safety is tasked with providing administrative support to the task force.

Kansas City Emergency Rental Assistance Center opens Sept. 17

City looking to expedite assistance for tenants in need

FOR IMMEDIATE RELEASE: Sept. 14, 2021

The Kansas City Emergency Rental Assistance Center (KCERAC) is opening at 1 p.m. on Friday, Sept. 17. The new center will help tenants in need by expediting distribution of Federal Emergency Relief Act Program funding.

So if you need help applying for emergency rent and utility assistance, you'll find

it inside of our Housing and Community Development Department offices at 4400 Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Blvd (formerly 4400 Blue Parkway).

Since Aug. 30, 2021, we have distributed nearly 75 percent (\$10,219,701) of this federal funding, earning recognition from the National Low Income Housing Coalition as an overall leader nationwide in ERAP fund distribution. Nearly 2,400 households have received an average of \$4,249 in assistance.

"The biggest challenge issue we have in processing applications is incorrect or insufficient information, so this will help us process the applications faster and get the money out faster to those who need it most," said Jennifer Tidwell, interim director of the Housing and Community Development Department. "The Housing Department would like to thank all of our community partners for their exceptional work in assisting KCMO residents."

The KCERAC will be open by appointment only on Sept. 17 from 1 p.m. to 4 p.m. After that, the center will follow this schedule:

- Beginning Monday, Sept. 20, the center is open by appointment only on Mondays and Wednesdays from 9 a.m. to noon; and 1-4 p.m.
- On Thursdays from 1-6 p.m.

Residents who need assistance must call (816) 513-4501 to schedule an appointment and COVID-19 restrictions apply, so you must wear a mask. Please bring:

- Identification (driver's license, birth certificate, etc.)
- Proof of Residency
- Proof of Income (pay stub, W-2 forms, 2020 tax return)
- Documentation of Need

There also will be opportunities for residents to learn more about the application process directly. There are three Saturday information sessions at Manual Career Technical High School, 1215 E. Truman Rd. The sessions run from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. Here are the details:



Important SNAP/Food Stamp dates to remember

The Department of Social Services (DSS) is taking extra steps to keep SNAP/Food Stamp recipients aware of upcoming changes and to ease the return to regular SNAP program benefits and operation.

*Starting October 1, 2021, regular SNAP benefit amounts will increase. The regular SNAP maximum benefit amount a family of four can receive in September (which includes the temporary 15 percent increase) is \$782 and starting October 1, that amount increases to \$835.

How to apply for SNAP benefits

For your ease, you can apply for SNAP benefits 24/7 online by visiting MyDSS.mo.gov, or sending a completed application and verification documents by email to FSD.Documents@dss.mo.gov, or by fax to 573-526-9400.
