Dear Neighbor,

In addition to updates on legislative matters, I have included the recent announcement by Governor Mike Parson that he will allow his current restrictions on public activity designed to limit the spread of COVID-19 to expire Monday, June 15, and to “fully reopen” the state June 16.

While nobody is wild about any level of government restricting their activities, I think most of us realize some restrictions are necessary to protect the public from irresponsible behavior.

I fear the governor may be scrapping our modest statewide restrictions too soon, which could result in new spikes of this potentially deadly virus which is still spreading in our state.

According to the state’s own dashboard on the virus referenced in the governor’s announcement, as of June 9 a total of 15,585 confirmed cases of COVID-19 had been recorded in Missouri, including 872 deaths. The latest figures from the KCMO Health Department show

1,525 confirmed cases in our city and 28 deaths.

Fortunately, the governor's order did not try to restrict local jurisdictions such as KCMO from continuing their restrictions.

As government restrictions are lifted, the responsibility falls on all of us to do our part to limit our exposure to catching the virus and to limit the possibility we could spread it to others since we can be contagious without even having symptoms.

Turning to another topic, I want to remind everyone to please fill out the information for your household for the 2020 census. This information is confidential and is essential for our south Kansas City community getting its fair share of government services and representation in legislative bodies since federal, state and local legislative bodies are reapportioned based on census data.

**It only takes a few minutes to fill out the requested census information, and persons can do it online at [2020census.gov](https://2020census.gov) or by calling 844-330-2020 from 6 a.m. to 1 a.m. daily.**

In August, census employees will begin visiting households that have not responded.

The 6th Council District cleanup from 8 a.m. to noon on Saturday, June 20, with drop off sites at the east parking lot of Ruskin High School and the parking lot of South-Broadland Presbyterian Church, 7850 Holmes Rd., which will accept bulky items such as old furniture & mattresses, leaves & brush and tires. The Ruskin site also will accept appliances and electronics. There is no charge for washers, dryers and stoves. There is a \$5 charge for CRT monitors, a \$10 charge for any items containing Freon, a \$20 charge for LED/LCD/plasma TVs, a \$30 charge for CRT TVs 26" or less and a \$50 charge for CRT TVs 27" or more and wood console & big screen/projection TVs. Persons dropping off items are requested to wear masks.**
- 1. A free food distribution for the first 500 needy families from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. on Wednesday, June 24, at Grandview High School, 2300 High Grove Rd., sponsored by Jackson County, Fox4 Love Fund and Sheriff Darryl Forte's office. Families are asked to clear trunk space in their vehicles since they will receive two boxes of produce and dairy products weighing 20-30 lbs. each that will be loaded into their vehicles.**

### **COURTS CLEAR MEDICAID EXPANSION FOR AUG. 4 BALLOT**

For the second time in less than a week, a Missouri court on June 8 ruled against two conservative groups' attempts to block voters from considering a proposed constitutional amendment on Medicaid expansion that will appear on the Aug. 4 statewide ballot.

Hours after the second adverse ruling, the Missouri Supreme Court issued an order declining to hear the case on appeal, bringing it to a swift and final resolution.

Amendment 2 would expand Missouri's Medicaid eligibility threshold to 138 percent of the federal poverty level. Under the federal Affordable Care Act, the federal government would pay 90 percent of the cost of expansion. After years of resistance by the Republican-dominated General Assembly, expansion supporters used the initiative petition process to bypass lawmakers and put the issue directly before voters.

#### **I signed the petition and supported the petition drive.**

The conservative groups United for Missouri and Americans for Prosperity-Missouri each sued, claiming Amendment 2 violates a state constitutional provision that prohibits using the initiative process for appropriating money, a power reserved solely for the General Assembly.

In a June 2 ruling, Cole County Judge Dan Green rejected that argument, noting that Amendment 2 neither appropriates money directly nor requires the legislature to do so. On June 8, a three-judge panel of the Western District Missouri Court of Appeals agreed.

"Funding for the Missouri Medicaid program, MO HealthNet, is appropriated annually by the General Assembly," Judge Mark Pfeiffer

wrote for the appellate court. “The proposed measure does not direct or restrict the General Assembly’s ability to change the amount of appropriations for the MO HealthNet program or to increase or decrease funding for the program based on health care-related costs.”

According to the official fiscal estimate prepared by the State Auditor’s Office, Amendment 2’s impact could vary widely, ranging from an additional \$200 million in costs to savings of \$1 billion by 2026. The possible savings would result from an estimated 230,000 more Missourians having access to basic preventative care, thus reducing the need for much more costly treatments later. **Missouri is one of only 14 states that haven’t implemented Medicaid expansion.**

## **STATE REVENUE COLLECTIONS CONTINUE STEEP DECLINE**

With just a month remaining in the 2020 fiscal year, net state general revenue collections were down 7.4 percent compared to the first 11 months of FY 2019, going from \$8.7 billion last fiscal year to \$8.06 billion this year.

Revenue collections had been up a robust 5.8 percent through the first nine months of FY 2020 before cratering in April and May due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

Net revenue collections for May 2020 were down 22.5 percent compared to May 2019, going from \$688.2 million last year to \$533.5 million this year. However, as bad as the May percentage drop was, it’s an improvement compared to April 2020. During April net revenue collections plummeted 54.3 percent compared to April 2019.

Because of the sudden and steep financial downturn, Gov. Mike Parson so far has imposed \$432.9 million in unilateral spending cuts to the FY 2020 state operating budget since April 1. **The bulk of the governor’s cuts have targeted state education spending.** The 2020 fiscal year ends June 30.

**GOVERNOR PARSON ANNOUNCES MISSOURI WILL FULLY REOPEN, ENTER PHASE 2 OF RECOVERY PLAN ON JUNE 16**

JEFFERSON CITY —Pending expiration of Phase 1 on June 15, Governor Mike Parson announced today that Missouri will fully reopen and enter Phase 2 of its “Show Me Strong Recovery” Plan on Tuesday, June 16, 2020.

“It is truly incredible to think about how far Missouri has come since March. At that time, no one knew what to expect. There was a lot of uncertainty, worry, and concern,” Governor Parson said. “Here we are today, just over 90 days since our first COVID-19 case in Missouri, and I am proud to say we have overcome all of these challenges and more than met our four pillars to reopen.”

During Phase 2, there will be no statewide health order. All statewide restrictions will be lifted, though local officials will still have the authority to put further rules, regulations, or ordinances in place.

The decision to reopen was dependent on the four essential “Show Me Strong Recovery” pillars:

1. Expand testing capacity and volume in the state
2. Expand reserves of PPE by opening public and private supply chains
3. Continue to monitor and, if necessary, expand hospital and health care system capacity
4. Improve ability to predict potential outbreaks using Missouri's public health data

Weekly testing in Missouri has increased more than 220 percent from approximately 16,000 test encounters the week of April 20 to over 53,000 encounters the week of May 25. Over the past two weeks, the state has averaged more than 10,000 tests per weekday.

Missouri continues to receive and distribute PPE across the state. Yesterday, the state reached a record PPE shipment, expanding to include not only hospitals, health care facilities, and EMS but also dental offices as more are reopening across the state. Yesterday's shipments included the following:

17,230 gowns  
42,720 N95 masks  
262,000 gloves  
77,100 surgical masks  
18,432 face shields

Missouri has also received national recognition for the use of its PPE marketplace, which helps health care providers with Missouri manufactures and suppliers. Currently, there are over 100 hospitals, 436 suppliers, and 1,567 health care providers, businesses, and other organizations registered in the PPE marketplace.

Regarding hospital capacity, hospitalizations fell by 43 percent statewide from May 1 to June 10. In April, the state converted a hotel into an alternate care site in just 11 days.

Missouri now also has a comprehensive [COVID-19 dashboard](#) containing data from across the state on testing, positivity rate, deaths, and hospitalizations. Much of the data is broken down further by county or demographics.

“We have learned and accomplished so much since March. Knowing what we know now, we are much better prepared to deal with COVID-19 going forward, and we are fully confident that Missouri is ready to take the next step,” Governor Parson said.

While Missouri will fully reopen on June 16, Governor Parson emphasized the importance of continuing social distancing and practicing proper hygiene to prevent the spread of COVID-19.

“We must remember that COVID-19 is not gone,” Governor Parson said. “It is still extremely important for everyone to continue social distancing. Be proactive. Avoid large, congested crowds, and if you can’t social distance, take extra precautions to protect yourself and those around you.”

“We all know how to do this now, and it is up to us to take responsibility for our own actions,” Governor Parson continued.

In preparation of Phase 2, Governor Parson signed Executive Order 20-12 extending the state of emergency in Missouri through December 30, 2020, in order to utilize federal CARES Act funding. Extending the state of emergency will also allow continued flexibility in deploying resources around the state as Missouri reopens and recovers from COVID-19.

Executive Order 20-12 also further extends four previous Executive Orders assisting with Missouri’s COVID-19 response through December 30:

1. Executive Order 20-04 easing regulatory burdens and certain provisions related to telemedicine and motor carriers

2. Executive Order 20-05 allowing the sale of unprepared restaurant foods to the public
3. Executive Order 20-06 mobilizing the National Guard in our response efforts
4. Executive Order 20-08 waiving the requirement for a person to be physically present in front of a notary public

## An Update on CAC's COVID-19 Services, Processes and Response



### **FOOD DISTRIBUTION**

Currently CAC is providing food for up to 20 families each day, about double normal distribution. About half of those are new clients and new to assistance.

**Drive up on Monday, Tuesday and Friday, 9 am - 2:30 pm -**

- Clients/new clients drive up to CAC; we ask that clients STAY IN THEIR CARS.
- CAC staff/volunteer asks client for name, address, income, how many people in family. Clients are checked against CAC's database.
- Pre-packed food will be brought out and placed in client's vehicle.
- CAC can serve up to 20 families per day. After that, clients may return on another distribution day.

**Frequency** - Each household may receive food from any one pantry per month.

**Service area** - CAC serves residents in this area:

- Kansas City, MO 85th Street and South (ZIP codes 64114, 64131, 64132, 64134, 64137, 64138 [not Raytown], 64139, 64145, 64146, 64147, 64149)
- All of Hickman Mills School District (including part in 64030)
- All of Center School District
- **Households outside CAC's service may receive food from CAC one time** then should go to their local pantry.
- **For a list of pantries**, visit Harvesters website, or call 211 for United Way's directory.

**Delivery to homebound on Thursdays.** Clients must call 816-763-3277 x 100 for an appointment. Leave one message only. Calls will be returned.

### **HAPPY BOTTOMS DIAPERS**

**Drive up on Thursdays, 10 am to 2 pm -**

- Current Happy Bottoms clients may drive up to CAC to pick up diapers, pull-ups once per month.
- If client has never received Happy Bottoms diapers, they must call 816-765-7455 or 785-845-0323 to preregister before they can receive diapers.

## South KC Mobile Food Pantries

With so many people out of work due to the coronavirus pandemic, a growing number of families in south Kansas City are being forced to rely on community food pantries such as Community Assistance Council's to have enough to eat.

Fortunately, Harvesters (the community food network) brings the semi-truck that serves as its mobile food pantry to four sites in south Kansas City monthly to distribute fresh produce and other healthy food to families in need. The sites are:

**Evangel Church**, 1414 E. 103<sup>rd</sup> St., from 7 to 8:30 a.m. the second Saturday of the month. Persons may remain in their vehicles, and food will be brought to them.

**Ruskin High School**, 7000 E. 111<sup>th</sup> St., from 4 to 5:30 p.m. the third Thursday of the month. Vehicles should line up on Ruskin Way on the east side of the school, and food will be loaded in the vehicles when they reach the school by staff and student volunteers. This event is sponsored by the school and Community Assistance Council.

**Colonial Presbyterian Church**, 9500 Wornall Rd., with registration beginning at 8 a.m. and food distribution running from about 8:30 to 10 a.m. on the third Saturday of the month. Families are asked to bring two cardboard boxes for volunteers to put the food in.

**Martin City K-8 School**, 201 E. 133<sup>rd</sup> St., from 11 a.m. until food runs out on the third Saturday of the month. This event is sponsored by Three Trails Community church.

## **Free Food Distribution**

**Jackson County, the Fox4 Love Fund and Sheriff Darryl Forte's office** are partnering to provide free fresh produce and dairy products on a first-come, first-served basis to 500 families from **10 a.m. to 2 p.m.** at each of three upcoming events including one **Wednesday, June 24, at Grandview High School, 2300 High Grove Road.**

Families are encouraged to clear trunk space in their vehicles since each box of produce and dairy products weighs 20-30 pounds.

## **UNEMPLOYMENT**

### **How to File?**

If you're eligible, you'll need the following:

1. Your Social Security number;
2. Any amount you were paid in the past week, before taxes and deductions;
3. The name and mailing address of each job you worked in the past 18 months;
4. The dates you started and ended work at each of those jobs.

If this is your first time filing for unemployment please watch [this video](#) on unemployment basics. Visit [uinteract.labor.mo.gov](http://uinteract.labor.mo.gov), create an

account and file your claim. If your job loss is related to coronavirus issues, make sure to check a box that says “COVID-19” in your application to waive a requirement to search for a new job amid the crisis.

Missouri provides benefits for up to 20 weeks, which can be extended to 33 weeks under the federal provisions.

The state will pay you up to \$320 per week, and the federal government will provide \$600 on top of whatever you get from the state for each week you're on employment prior to July 31.

Benefits can be paid within 22 days unless there is an issue with your eligibility, which on average can take 4-6 weeks to resolve.

You should continue filing weekly requests for payment even if you have not yet received benefits.



**SUBJECT: Reward Increase – 9 Year Old Dominic Young  
Homicide**

**KANSAS CITY, MO --- The Kansas City, Missouri Police Department and the Greater KC Crime Stoppers TIPS Hotline continue to seek information in the January 20, 2018 homicide of 9 year old Dominic Young Jr. at 71 Highway and Emanuel Cleaver II Blvd.**

**Dominic Young Jr. was apparently hit by a stray gunshot while occupying a vehicle driven by his father and died as a result of his injuries. Dominic, his father and brother were en route to Grandview at the time. The vehicle driven by Dominic's father was hit by gunshots from other vehicles apparently engaged in a gunfight according to statements.**

**KCPD found a possible crime scene near the intersection where the father said the shooting happened. When the father arrived home in Grandview, Dominic was not responsive. Grandview police initially responded to the father's home and found the boy in critical condition. He was later pronounced dead at a hospital.**

**A number of community leaders and organizations including State Representative Richard Brown, Mayor Pro Tem Kevin McManus, former City Councilmen Scott Taylor, Scott Wagner, John Sharp; the City of KCMO and Concord Fortress of Hope Church (Pastor Ron Lindsay) have come forward to increase the existing reward in the case up to \$30,000.00. Those leaders are available for comment in regard to the case.**
