DSS GRILLED OVER MISSING FOSTER CHILDREN

State lawmakers questioned Missouri Department of Social Services leaders

on Oct. 5 over a scathing new federal report finding that nearly 1,000 children in foster care in the state went missing at some point in 2019 and that the agency lacks policies to effectively deal with the problem.

The department had few answers for lawmakers.

The report by the Office of Inspector General of the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services was issued Sept. 30.

The inspector general's office said it decided to undertake the review based on the concerns of its agents, who in 2019 assisted other federal and local agencies in helping to locate some of the 978 children who went missing from Missouri foster care that year.

"In cases reviewed in detail, the Missouri foster care agency rarely attempted to reduce children's risk of going missing," the report said. "Additionally, it failed to protect children who went missing from foster care and did not effectively use resources to assist in locating them. As a result, these children were exposed to additional risks associated with being missing from care, such as a heightened risk for sex trafficking and poorer outcomes related to health, safety, education and involvement in the criminal justice system."

During a hearing of the House Children and Families Committee held just days after the report became public, Social Services Department Director Jennifer Tidball acknowledged problems but offered little indication of what the department plans to do to fix them.

Lawmakers are expected to continue their inquiries into the matter.

HIGH COURT HEARS TICKETING PRACTICES CASE

The Missouri Supreme Court heard arguments on Oct. 6 in a case to determine whether statutes imposing special limits on fine collection and municipal operations in St. Louis County that the court ruled unconstitutional four years ago should be reinstated because of a subsequent change in the court's relevant precedent.

The case involves portions of a 2015 law, Senate Bill 5, imposing

sweeping reforms aimed at reducing abusive municipal court and policing practices that allegedly emphasized generating revenue for city governments over public safety.

Although most of the reforms apply statewide, two key provisions affect only municipalities in St. Louis County.

One caps the amount of revenue municipal governments in the county can collect from fines and fees at 12.5 percent of a municipality's operating budget. All other Missouri cities are subject to a 20 percent cap. The other provision specific to St. Louis County imposes a variety of minimal standards for municipal operations and requires city police departments to be accredited.

Normandy and several other St. Louis County cities challenged the provisions for violating a state constitutional prohibition against "special laws" that apply only to certain jurisdictions without justification. Cole County Circuit Judge Jon Beetem blocked enforcement of both provisions in 2016. The state Supreme Court upheld Beetem's ruling in 2017.

However, the high court subsequently overhauled its standard for reviewing special laws in an unrelated December 2019 case and invalidated much of its precedent on the subject, including its prior ruling involving SB 5. That prompted Attorney General Eric Schmitt to ask Beetem to lift his 2016 injunction barring enforcement of St. Louis County-specific provisions, a request Beetem granted in December 2020. Schmitt sponsored SB 5 while a state senator.

During the latest round of arguments, Supreme Court Judge Patricia Breckenridge noted the court has never before resurrected a statute it previously ruled unconstitutional, even if there was a subsequent change in interpretation. She suggested a more appropriate remedy might be for the legislature to re-enact the relevant provisions.

On the question of whether a "rational basis" exists for treating St. Louis County differently than Missouri's other 113 counties, attorneys for the state said the county has a well-known reputation for so-called "taxation by citation" practices. However, the cities said the state offered no evidence that the practice is unique to St. Louis County, and

the evidence it did present relating to the county was several years out of date.

Judge Paul Wilson questioned whether the state can even raise that argument now since it failed to do so the first time the case was before the court.

The Supreme Court will issue a ruling at a later date.

The case is City of Normandy v. Michael Parson.

JUDGE RULES AGAINST MOVE TO WEAKEN UNION

A Cole County judge has ordered Gov. Mike Parson's administration to resume withholding union dues from the paychecks of prison guards, ruling the decision to cease doing so was "unconstitutional, arbitrary, capricious and unreasonable."

The Missouri Office of Administration, which handles payroll for state agencies, informed the Missouri Corrections Officers Association in December 2019 that it would cease withholding dues from the paychecks of the organization's roughly 1,300 members. The move was widely seen as an attempt to weaken the union by making it difficult to collect dues from members.

The administration originally claimed it could no longer withhold the dues because the union's contract with the state Department of Corrections had expired, although negotiations on a new contract continue. However, since the state routinely withholds fees for other non-union employee organizations, it quickly shifted its rationale to claim the Corrections Officers Association wasn't an employee organization since it included some auxiliary members who weren't active state employees, such as retirees.

However, Circuit Judge Jon Beetem found that, too, was a pretext since the Office of Administration continues to withhold dues and fees at the behest of other employee groups that have non-employee members. It also refused to resume collecting dues from prison guards after their association changed its bylaws to no longer allow auxiliary members. Beetem declared an administrative rule the Office of Administration enacted to justify its position

unconstitutional.

"The Rule infringes on the constitutional rights of MOCOA and its members," Beetem wrote. "It penalizes them for exercise of the right to organize and bargain collectively, by denying them payroll deduction authority, while other employee associations, who seek to promote the welfare of employees and to lobby like MOCOA, continue to receive the benefit."

Beetem issued his order on Sept. 27 but stayed enforcement until Nov. 1 to give the Parson administration a chance to appeal. No appeal had yet been filed as of Oct. 5.

The case is Missouri Corrections Officers Association Inc. v. Missouri Office of Administration.




MCPL Food for Fines for CAC

Mid-Continent Public Library Trades Food for Fines

Greater Kansas City, MO – Mid-Continent Public Library's biannual Food for Fines program is back! This fall, Food for Fines will be held from **Monday**, **October 11**, **through Sunday**, **October 17**. During the weeklong initiative, MCPL customers will have the chance to donate nonperishable food items in place of money to pay off overdue fines or replacement card charges.

Customers with no fines or fees can also donate to "pay it forward" toward another customer's fees. Following the completion of the program, the food will be given to charitable organizations across the Kansas City metro.

Traditionally, MCPL offers the Food for Fines program twice a year—leading into the summer to encourage active participation in the annual Summer Library Program and in the fall to alleviate any barriers for students seeking resources at the Library—however, it's been on pause since 2019 due to COVID-19. To date, the Library has collected more than 145,000 items for local charities through the program.

Suggested donations include boxed meals, canned food, peanut

butter, cereal, and pasta. Donations must not be expired, damaged, open, non-nutritious, or in a glass, plastic, or cardboard drink container. Each donated food item will count as \$1 toward a customer's fines and fees (up to \$10).



South KC Mobile Food Pantries

Many families in south Kansas City are being forced to rely on community food pantries such as Community Assistance Council's to have enough to eat.

Fortunately, Harvesters (the community food network) brings the semi-truck that serves as its mobile food pantry to seven sites in south Kansas City monthly to distribute fresh produce and other healthy food to families in need. The sites

are:

Center District Warehouse, 8701 Holmes Rd., from 11:30 a.m. to 1:30 p.m. the second Friday of each month. Persons should go to the entrance to the Center Administrative Office and drive through the bus parking lot to the warehouse where volunteers will load the food. Persons should take the Troost Ave exit. The event is sponsored by the Center Education Foundation in partnership with the Center School District.

Evangel Church, 1414 E. 103rd St., from 7 to 8:30 a.m. the second Saturday of the month. Persons may remain in their vehicles, and food will be brought to them.

United Believers Community Church, 5600 E. 112th Terr., with vehicles lining up at 8:30 a.m. and contactless food distribution running from 9 to 11 a.m. the third Wednesday of the month.

Ruskin High School, 7000 E. 111th St., from 4 to 5:30 p.m. the third Thursday of the month. Vehicles should line up on Ruskin Way on the east side of the school, and staff and students will load the food when vehicles reach the school.

Colonial Presbyterian Church, 9500 Wornall Rd., with registration beginning at 8 a.m. and food distribution running from about 8:30 to 10 a.m. on the third Saturday of the month. Families are asked to bring two cardboard boxes for volunteers to put the food in.

Center School District, 8701 Holmes Rd., from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. as long as food is left on the third Saturday of the month. Persons should drive through the bus parking lot to the district warehouse. The event is sponsored by Three Trails Community church in partnership with the Center School District.

Red Bridge United Methodist Church, 636 E. 117th St., from 2:30 to 3:30 p.m. the fourth Friday of the month in the church parking lot.
