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GOP plan to give \$1 billion to wealthy likely dead in Senate

The Republican-controlled House of Representatives on April 21 voted 103-44 in favor of controversial legislation to provide \$1 billion in tax breaks to more affluent Missourians while shutting out most

taxpayers. The plan, however, is likely to die in the Senate, where lawmakers are allocating a current revenue surplus to address long-neglected funding needs.

Supporters of House Bill 3021 claim it would give eligible taxpayers a one-time credit of up to \$500 for an individual and \$1,000 for married couple against their state income tax liability. The way the bill is structured, however, no taxpayers actually would receive the full amount and most would get little or nothing. The Missouri Division of Budget and Planning estimates top recipients would get no more than \$378 for an individual, or \$757 for a married couple.

House Republican leaders unveiled HB 3021 just a week earlier and days after the chamber voted down a similar Democratic plan that sought to provide \$1,000 payments narrowly targeted for low-and moderate-income households. Democrats said their approach of getting money to Missourians most likely to spend it on essential needs would provide a greater economic benefit than the Republican approach of targeting only the wealthy.

The legislation likely won't progress, however, since the Senate already has allocated for the state operating budget much of the general revenue surplus HB 3021 would use for tax breaks. In addition, Republican Gov. Mike Parson has publicly stated his opposition to the bill.

The House also approved three additional budget bills that would provide a combined \$1.38 billion in spending authority for various capital improvement needs. The Senate is expected to approve those bills, though possibly with changes.



Senate committee advances FY 2023 state operating budget

With just over two weeks until the constitutional budget deadline, the Senate Appropriations Committee on April 20 approved most of the bills that make up the state operating budget for the 2023 fiscal year. The full Senate could begin debating the bills as early as April 25.

Once the bills pass the upper chamber, final negotiations can begin with the House of Representatives, which has approved a version of the budget calling for \$46.52 billion in spending, while leaving at least \$1.8 billion in available revenue unexpended. The total amount of spending authority provided in the Senate version wasn't immediately clear but is expected to be well in excess of \$47 billion.

One key Senate change is to provide an additional \$214 million to fully fund the state's share of local public school districts' student transportation costs, something the state hasn't done in three decades. The Senate also approved a \$27 million plan requested by the governor, but rejected by House Republicans, to increase minimum public school teacher pay to \$38,000 a year.

Although the appropriations committee advanced the 13 bills that typically make up the operating budget, this year there is an

additional bill allocating federal pandemic relief funds. The Senate panel has yet to act on it but is expected to do so in the coming days. While the governor requested \$3.12 billion in spending from those funds, the House trimmed it to \$2.58 billion.

Lawmakers must grant final passage to the budget bills by 6 p.m. on May 6. If they fail to approve some or all of the bills by the deadline, the governor would be forced to call a special legislative session for lawmakers to pass the remaining bills before the new state fiscal year begins July 1.




Senate passes compromise on charter school funding

The Senate on April 20 voted 29-5 to pass compromise legislation that would change how charter schools are funded. The bill returns to the House of Representatives, which approved a radically different version of it more than a month ago.

The House can grant final passage to the Senate version or seek to negotiate an alternate version of the bill. Charter schools are public schools that operate independently of their local school district and are exempt from many state education regulations. At present, they are allowed to operate only in Kansas City and St. Louis.

As passed by the lower chamber, House Bill 1552 would have redirected millions of dollars in state funding from the Kansas City and St. Louis school districts to the charter schools in their jurisdictions. The Senate compromise would modify the statutory formula for distributing state funding to local schools so that charter schools would receive additional funding without reducing the amount of money going to the local districts. The plan would a cost about \$62 million more in funding for the upcoming fiscal year.

The Senate version also includes reforms to how charter school operate, including that they be run by a not-for-profit entity and require board members to be Missouri residents. In addition, the bill also includes changes to how on-line virtual schools must operate.



Senate approves two amendments to limit property taxes

The Senate on April 21 passed a pair of proposed constitutional

amendments aimed at limiting property taxes. The measures now advance to the House of Representatives. If approved by both chambers, they automatically would go on the Nov. 8 ballot for separate voter consideration.

Senate Joint Resolution 39 would give the legislature the authority to limit by statute the amount by which the tax assessment on residential property increases over the prior assessment. It passed on a vote of 27-7.

Senate Joint Resolution 41 would allow each county, plus St. Louis city, to adopt local ordinances exempting those age 65 or older from paying property taxes on their homes. It passed on a vote of 29-2.

SUBJECT: Reward Increase – 9 Year Old Dominic Young Homicide

KANSAS CITY, MO --- The Kansas City, Missouri Police Department and the Greater KC Crime Stoppers TIPS Hotline continue to seek information in the January 20, 2018 homicide of 9 year old Dominic Young Jr. at 71 Highway and Emanuel Cleaver II Blvd.

Dominic Young Jr. was apparently hit by a stray gunshot while occupying a vehicle driven by his father and died as a result of his injuries. Dominic, his father and brother

were en route to Grandview at the time. The vehicle driven by Dominic's father was hit by gunshots from other vehicles apparently engaged in a gunfight according to statements.

KCPD found a possible crime scene near the intersection where the father said the shooting happened. When the father arrived home in Grandview, Dominic was not responsive. Grandview police initially responded to the father's home and found the boy in critical condition. He was later pronounced dead at a hospital.

A number of community leaders and organizations including State Representative Richard Brown, Mayor Pro Tem Kevin McManus, former City Councilmen Scott Taylor, Scott Wagner, John Sharp; the City of KCMO and Concord Fortress of Hope Church (Pastor Ron Lindsay) have come forward to increase the existing reward in the case up to \$30,000.00. Those leaders are available for comment in regard to the case.
